Each Year our family and some nice friends put on a 5k race to raise money for the "American Cancer Society". It was inspired by our Mom who was diagnosed with colon cancer and a "once a Marine always a Marine" husband who is a runner. He, along with our family, wanted to feel like we were doing something to help, not only our situation with Mom, but for others who feel or have felt the same way as us. Our Mom, Norma Cartwright, did not make it to that first race as she passed away in February, about 3 months before, but we chose to go on ahead in her memory and in honor of our Dad, Bill Cartwright. Each year I have had the privilege of working at the race but also watching the people there and listening to stories. I have noticed many things. Everyone starts out the same at the "Starting Line." Some doing stretching exercises, some jogging in place, some laughing and talking, but all anxiously anticipating the sound of the air horn. "On your mark, get set, BLAST," and off they go, a herd of feet pounding the pavement. After all of that, there is kind of a silence in the park. It really is a sight to see, but I think the most exciting part is yet to come, "The Finish Line!" Each 5k'er now gets personal. The coveted trophy for 1<sup>st</sup> place, all of the medals given to participants who placed in each category, but greater still, the stories unfold before my eyes. I enjoy watching for the first person to sprint down the wooden walkway next to the bridge, down the path, right across that "Finish line!" I think to myself, how did he do that in such a short time? He must have wings! (LOL) What motivates that kind of "time" exactly?

What's his story? Some questions will never be answered! I saw a lady last year, hands flailing in the air, screaming out "I did it! This is my first run!" I was so happy for her and proud of her too! I saw husband & wife, Scott & Shawn, who this was their first time running a race and have gone on to do others, even runs out of the state of Michigan. I saw Brad Goslin, running in Memory of his Dad that he just lost to cancer. I believe it was his first time running a race as well. I saw Roy Greenwood and his daughter-in-law Ashley.
